- **CD and DVD Recordings** An entire concert is recorded while on tour as well as full coverage of the tour on DVD. Both are made available to the students.
- Who May Participate Participation in the SIHB is by invitation only to students who have demonstrated an excellence in their level of performance on their chosen instrument. All candidates should be recommended by their band director or private instructor.
- Auditions Auditions may be recorded or in person. Auditions are waived when the applicant has demonstrated special talent or upon recommendation by an expert in the field.

Take-a-Friend Plan We have found that many participants enjoy their tour even more if they have a friend along to share the experiences and adventures with them. Participants may recommend a fellow musician if they wish, provided that person is an adequate performer.

Dr. Al G. Wright and Gladys Stone Wright - Conductor, Tour Director - Director Emeritus of the Purdue University Bands, author, clinician, internal adjudicator, Dr. Wright has served as guest conductor of All-State bands in 47 states and Canadian provinces. He is the founding President of the National Band Association, past-president of the National Interscholastic Music Commission, and a past-president of

the American Bandmasters' Association. Listed in the International Who's Who in Music, Who's Who in America, and Who's Who in the World. He is presently the President of the John Philip Sousa Foundation. Mrs. Wright is the founding President of the Women Band Directors' National Association; first woman to be elected to the prestigious American Bandmasters' Association, she has served as conductor of youth bands throughout Europe and the Americas on some 50 tours. Typical 17 Day-by-Day Itinerary

Austria Belgium Holland/Netherlands France Germany Italy Switzerland - Study this itinerary carefully—it is a blueprint of an exciting, once-in-a-lifetime musical adventure.

Day 1 – BOSTON/BRUSSELS - Final pre-tour concert. Afternoon bus transfer to airport. TOUR OFFICIALLY BEGINS. Check-in for our transatlantic flight to Brussels.

Day 2 – BRUSSELS TO HOMESTAY - Welcome to Brussels! Upon arrival we board our deluxe motor coaches to begin our sightseeing tour of this historic Belgian city. We will depart midafternoon to our nearby home stay in Opgrimbie where we will be received by our host families, and the Burgermeister.

Day 3 – HOMESTAY – We spend the day with our host families in Opgrimble after a morning rehearsal. Possible concert on this day.

Day 4 – HOLLAND-MARGRATEN - We will board our coaches and travel to Margraten, Holland in the Netherlands for our first Feature Concert.

Day 5 - HOMESTAY/BONN/BACHARACH We bid farewell to our new friends, and depart for a nearby World War II American Cemetery; stop at Bonn, Germany for lunch and a visit to Beethoven's birthplace. Then a drive down the lovely Rhine valley to the medieval town of Bacharach, founded in the 9th Century. Here we will be close to the Burg Stahleck 12th Century fortified castle.



Day 6 – BACHARACH - Morning rehearsal in the Knight Hall at the castle. Afternoon Rhine cruise, shopping and an evening concert in the Town Hall.

Day 7 - BACHARACH/GRÖDIG/SALZBURG - Today we travel in Germany to the Dachau Concentration Camp outside of Munich, then on to Austria where we will stay in the ski resort town of Grödig, just outside of Salzburg.

Day 8 – GRÖDIG/SALZBURG/GRÖDIG - A hearty breakfast, a rehearsal and into Salzburg, 4 miles away, to visit Mozart's birthplace and the site of "Sound of Music." We return to Grödig for dinner and our evening concert.

Day 9 - GRÖDIG/INNSBRUCK/LUGANO – We get an early start from Grödig and travel to Innsbruck, site of the 1960 Winter Olympics, where we present a concert by the famed "Golden Roof". After the concert, we depart for Lugano, Switzerland.

Day 10-LUGANO/LUINO/LUGANO - Following the short morning rehearsal, the remainder of the day is yours to explore, swim, shop, etc. After dinner, we transfer to nearby Luino, the Italian resort town on Lake Maggiore for a concert. The musicloving Italians make a great audience.

Day 11 – LUGANO - A hearty breakfast, rehearsal, and more sightseeing.

Day 12 – LUGANO/CHAMONIX - Leaving Lugano, we travel along beautiful Lake Maggiore and into the Italian Alps to the ski resort of Courmayeur, perched high on a mountainside for our late afternoon concert. Following a drive through a 7-mile tunnel to the French Ski resort of Chamonix, nestled under the shadow of Mont Blanc, the highest peak in Europe, we have dinner.

Day 13 – CHAMONIX - This morning, we take 2 cable cars to Mt. Brevard for a spectacular view of the Alps. Our late afternoon concert is a "sell-out" – no wonder this stop is an all-time favorite of students!

Day 14 – CHAMONIX/LA CHAUX-DE-FONDS - We depart at noon for our short ride through beautiful Switzerland to the watch capital of the world, La Chaux -de-Fonds, for our recorded concert in the "Salon de Musique," a major recording auditorium in Europe.

Day 15 – LA CHAUX-DE-FONDS/PARIS - An early departure this morning for Paris, "City of Lights," via a drive through scenic France. Visit the famous Fountainebleu Castle where Napoleon was crowned. This evening we will visit the famous Eiffel Tower after our delicious French dinner. *The Eiffel Tower is 6 blocks from our accommodations.*

Day 16 – **PARIS** - Our morning sightseeing tour includes Chopin's house, Notre Dame Cathedral, the Champs-Elysees, the Arc de Triomphe, the Louvre and much more. This afternoon we play our final concert in the Kiosk at the Luxembourg Gardens for an enthusiastic, autograph-seeking audience. Then we visit Montmartre, the famous artist colony with an opportunity to have our portrait drawn in charcoal. FINAL DINNER
